AGREEMENT is made and entered into as of this 4 day of 1013, by and between

THE SCHOOL BOARD OF BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA

(hereafter referred to as SBBC), a body corporate and political subdivision of the State of Florida, whose principal place of business is 600 Southeast Third Avenue, Fort Lauderdale, Florida 33301

and

THE DISTRICT BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF BROWARD COLLEGE, FLORIDA

(hereafter referred to as BC), a political subdivision of the State of Florida, whose principal place of business is 225 East Las Olas Blvd, Fort Lauderdale, Florida 33301

WHEREAS, SBBC and BC are required by Section 1007.235, Florida Statutes to enter into a Dual Enrollment Articulation Agreement, which outlines how both institutions will partner to provide accelerated programs to eligible home education and public students,

WHEREAS, dual enrollment, an articulated acceleration mechanism between SBBC and BC, shall serve to shorten the time necessary for college-ready students to complete the requirements associated with the conferment of a degree or certificate, broaden the scope of curricular options available to students, and increase the depth of study in a student's major area of interest by offering college credit courses to eligible high school students,

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and of the mutual covenants contained herein and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1 - RECITALS

Recitals. The Parties agree that the foregoing recitals are true and correct and that such recitals are incorporated herein by reference.

ARTICLE 2 – SPECIAL CONDITIONS

2.1 Term of Agreement. The term of this Agreement shall be effective on the date Florida Bill No. SB 1514 becomes law, shall commence on August 1, 2013 and shall be effective through July 31, 2014 unless terminated by any party pursuant to this Agreement. Any party to this Agreement shall have the right to terminate this Agreement for convenience and without cause by delivery of written notice to the other parties not less than (90) days prior to the effective date of said termination.

- 2.2 <u>Joint Responsibilities</u>. SBBC and BC shall maintain responsibility for implementing this Agreement and shall review this Agreement and performance of parties hereunder each year to ensure that it continues to serve their mutual interests. BC and SBBC may provide personally identifiable student records to each other in the performance of this agreement. Such records are provided pursuant to Sections 1002.22 and, 1002.221 Florida Statutes, and 20 U.S.C. 1232g. Each party further agrees to comply with Sections 1002.22 and 1002.221, Florida Statutes, and 20 U.S.C. 1232g, including but not limited to provisions related to confidentiality, access, consent, length of retention and security of student records.
- 2.3 <u>Indemnification</u>. To the extent permitted by law, each party agrees to be fully responsible for its acts of negligence or its agent's acts of negligence when acting within the scope of their employment and agrees to be liable for any damages resulting from said negligence.

ARTICLE 3- BROWARD COUNTY ARTICULATION COMMITTEE

- 3.1 SBBC and BC agree to utilize the Broward County Articulation Committee (Committee) to monitor the activities established by this Agreement, to recommend enhancements and other changes, and to generally promote articulation.
- 3.2 Committee members and/or designees shall be as follows:

Director of Academic Affairs Student Affairs Dean College Registrar/Associate Vice President for Student Affairs Associate Dean of Student Affairs/Advisement Testing Coordinator

3.3 The Committee will meet in September and February and other times as needed. All parties agree to abide by any Florida Department of Education rule changes regarding college credit dual enrollment passed during the relevant fiscal year.

ARTICLE 4 - CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION ARTICULATION AGREEMENTS

The Career Pathways program provides an opportunity for students to engage in a 4.1 rigorous curriculum that integrates academic and technical education competencies and learning experiences, and utilizes applied learning strategies associated with specific careers. Through numerous career and technical education articulation agreements, students are eligible to receive college credits for completion of a career and technical education program at their high school, thus saving them time and money in their pursuit of a postsecondary technical certificate or degree. Together both institutions work collaboratively in marketing programs, recruiting students, providing staff development, transitioning students, evaluating programs, and assessing results. The programmatic articulation agreements are aligned and enhanced with Florida state-mandated articulation agreements. The School Board of Broward County (SBBC) and Broward College (BC) have established the following agreements, which are hereby ratified: Career and Technical Education articulation agreements (Appendix B). Appendix B identifies the list of career and technical education articulation agreements, including the possible number of credits to be awarded. The college and SBBC will continue to develop new programmatic articulation agreements that will become a part of the Dual Enrollment articulation agreement.

<u>ARTICLE 5 - INFORMATION FOR STUDENTS AND PARENTS</u>

- 5.1 SBBC will provide students and families with informational documents describing the educational benefits and eligibility requirements for the various program acceleration options as required per Florida Statutes Section 1007.271(8) as well as a copy of the Dual Enrollment Transfer Guarantees as required per Florida Statutes Section 1007.271(15).
- 5.2 Each high school curriculum guide will describe acceleration options.
- 5.3 On an annual basis, SBBC will notify the parents of rising 9th graders regarding the importance of rigorous coursework such as Advanced Placement and Dual Enrollment courses.

- 5.4 In a cooperative effort, admissions and registration personnel from BC will be available to local area high schools to provide additional information and answer specific questions students may have.
- 5.5 BC admissions and registration personnel will provide dual enrollment information at events for high school students, such as college and career fairs, information sessions, or BC Open House events.

ARTICLE 6 - APPROVED COURSES

- 6.1 BC agrees to permit high school students enrolled in eligible home education or public schools in Broward County, who have been certified by their principals and qualified, to dually enroll in the approved courses listed in **Appendix A**, under the provisions of Florida Statutes, applicable state rules or regulation, and the terms and conditions of this agreement. Appendix A may be changed upon mutual agreement of the Broward College President and Broward County School Superintendent, or their designees, without resubmission for approval to the School Board or Board of Trustees.
- 6.2 Students who are eligible for Dual Enrollment may be permitted to enroll in Dual Enrollment courses conducted during school hours, after school hours, and during the summer term. (During the summer term, SBBC will not pay tuition or books for dual enrolled students).

ARTICLE 7 - STUDENT ELIGIBILITY AND ADMISSIONS

- 7.1 The admissions and registration officials at the BC campus in the area of participating high schools will provide appropriate forms and will work jointly with the designated high school guidance staff to accomplish application and registration requirements. A home education dual enrollment student must be registered with SBBC.
- 7.2 Students participating in dual enrollment options must meet the following minimum entrance eligibility requirements: (1) enrolled in a course of study which will fulfill requirements for high school graduation; (2) 3.0 cumulative unweighted high school GPA and; (3) must earn the minimum standardized college placement scores for college-level courses in all three placement subject areas (Reading, Math, and English), and satisfy the college preparatory testing requirements of Florida Statutes Section 1008.30(4)(a) and Florida Administrative Code Rule 6A-10.0315, which is hereby incorporated by reference. Students already enrolled in BC for dual enrollment classes prior to the 2013-14 academic year may continue to participate in the dual enrollment program at BC even if they are not college-ready in all areas.
- 7.3 For classes offered in Winter Term 2014 (January May 2014), interested eligible students must submit an online Application for Admission. The guidance counselor is responsible for compiling and submitting to BC Confidential Recommendation forms, A14 screenshots, and A21 screenshots for each student prior to the published deadline dates for each semester. The completed Confidential

Recommendation form must be signed by the student, parent or guardian, the high school guidance counselor, and the high school principal to ensure that the course will count toward high school graduation. After all required forms are submitted to BC by the high school guidance counselor, students will be allowed to register online for open courses approved by their high school guidance counselor. Registration dates for dual enrollment students can be found in the official BC academic calendars which are posted online at http://www.broward.edu/calendar/Pages/term-dates.aspx.

- 7.4 It is the responsibility of the student and the high school guidance counselor to complete the required sections of the forms and select the courses from the approved dual credit course list (**Appendix A**) that are aligned to core subject areas. As educational planning is strongly encouraged, students who bring incomplete dual enrollment applications and/or forms to the BC Admissions Office will not be permitted to register for dual enrollment.
- 7.5 Other required documents needed in order to complete the Dual Enrollment admissions process include:
 - a. Test score reports for approved standardized assessments such as ACT, FCAT 2.0, SAT or the PERT; and
 - b. An official copy of the transcript will be provided by the high school for purpose of advising, counseling, and GPA verification.
 - c. Each SBBC student who wishes to participate in the dual enrollment program may take the Postsecondary Education Readiness Test (PERT) at no cost on his/her first attempt. For retakes, the student will pay a retake testing fee (currently \$15) to BC. For subsequent retesting, the student must provide satisfactory evidence to the Testing Center indicating the student has participated in remediation or skill review per BC policy/procedure 6Hx2-5.14.
- 7.6 Students are required to submit a completed *Confidential Recommendation* form each term for BC to determine continued eligibility status for participating in dual enrollment.
- 7.7 Eligible students are subject to any credit limits prescribed by law, the State Board of Education, or any other applicable policy. After obtaining an associate's degree or the student turns 19 (whichever occurs first), the student may not be admitted to BC as a dual enrollment student unless otherwise provided by law.
- 7.8 All Dual Enrollment students are responsible for officially withdrawing from classes they are no longer attending. The Registrar's office must receive an official withdrawal from a Dual Enrollment course(s) by the deadline published by BC. Students who do not officially withdraw from a class may receive a failing grade, which becomes a part of their permanent transcript records and could have a negative effect on future college admissions, scholarship opportunities, and/or financial aid.
- 7.9 SBBC will not reimburse BC for classes students drop.

<u>ARTICLE 8 - ADDITIONAL STUDENT ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS</u>

General Dual Enrollment Program Requirements:

- 8.1 Students who have completed 11 high school credits prior to the fall term may be concurrently enrolled at BC in postsecondary courses creditable toward a diploma, college credit certificate, or an associate degree provided they meet program rules and regulations. If the student is projected to graduate from high school before the scheduled completion date of a postsecondary course, the student may not register for that course through dual enrollment/Early Admissions program. However, the student may apply to BC and pay the required registration, tuition, and fees if the student meets BC's admissions requirements under Florida Statutes Section 1007.263.
- 8.2 In order to continue in the program, students must maintain a 3.0 unweighted GPA in their high school academic work and earn a grade of "C" or better in each college-level course as confirmed by their high school guidance director and the BC registrar's office. Dual enrollment students who receive a "D" or an "F" must sit out of the program for two consecutive terms before being allowed to continue, provided they still meet program eligibility requirements. Students may only be allowed to repeat the course of which a "D" or "F" was received for grade forgiveness after graduation from high school (not applicable to College Academy or Early Admissions students).
- 8.3 Regardless of meeting student eligibility requirements for continued enrollment, a student may lose the opportunity to participate in a dual enrollment course if the student is disruptive to the learning process such that the progress of other students or the efficient administration of the course is hindered. Students should adhere to the Student Handbook as published on the BC website http://www.broward.edu/studentlife/publications/Pages/Student-Handbook.aspx.

Special Dual Enrollment Programs:

- 8.4 College Academy students are subject to additional eligibility criteria as published by the College Academy. College Academy students are subject to alternative criteria for continuing in the program as published by the College Academy.
- 8.5 Early Admission, a form of dual enrollment, allows eligible senior students to enroll full-time at BC (at least, 12 credit hours in fall and winter terms) as a dual enrollment student instead of attending high school for the senior year. After early admission students complete the fall and winter terms at BC, they will no longer be able to enroll at BC as an early admissions student. Early admissions students wishing to matriculate to BC will need to submit their final high school transcript showing the graduation date.
 - a) An Early Admission student who earns a D or F in a dual enrollment course may continue in the program upon gaining approval from his/her parent, guidance

counselor and principal who will all certify that the student, if allowed to continue, is still on track for high school graduation.

- 8.6 BC shall enter into a home education articulation agreement with each home school education student seeking enrollment in a dual enrollment course and the student's parent. The home education articulation agreement includes:
 - a) A list of approved courses (**Appendix A**) available to dually enrolled home education students.
 - b) The eligibility requirements for home education student participation. The home education dual enrollment student is only required to meet the same placement scores as a Broward County Public School student.
 - c) The student's responsibilities for providing his or her own instructional materials and transportation.
 - d) A copy of the statement on transfer guarantees developed by the Florida Department of Education.
- 8.7 Eligible home education dual enrollment students are subject to the same academic load limits as defined in BC policy.. After obtaining an associate's degree or the student turns 19 (whichever occurs first), the home education student may not be admitted to BC as a dual enrollment student unless otherwise provided by law.

ARTICLE 9 - HIGH SCHOOL CREDITS EARNED

9.1 The approved dual credit course list, **Appendix A**, outlines the number of high school credits earned for each college-level course successfully completed by a dual enrollment student as defined by the Florida Department of Education.

ARTICLE 10 - COLLEGE LEVEL COURSE EXPECTATIONS

Both BC and SBBC will collaborate in notifying the students of the options to participate in Dual Enrollment, and will inform students and parents or guardians of college course-level expectations, including, but not limited to the following:

- 10.1 Dual enrollment courses must meet college curricular expectations and are at the same depth and rigor of non-dual enrollment college instruction, including those dual enrollment courses offered on the high school campus;
- 10.2 Any letter grade below a "C" will not count as credit toward satisfaction of the requirements in Florida Administrative Code Rule 6A-10.030; however, all grades are calculated in a student's GPA and will appear on their high school and college transcripts;
- 10.3 All grades, including "W" for withdrawal, become a part of the student's permanent college transcript and may affect subsequent postsecondary admission, scholarship, and financial opportunities;

- 10.4 Dual enrollment students are required to abide by the same guidelines outlined in BC's Student Handbook, which contains the academic calendar, code of conduct, students' rights and responsibilities, grading and evaluation process, academic dishonesty, disciplinary procedures, as well as accommodations provided for students with disabilities. No exceptions to these guidelines will be made for dual enrollment students. The student handbook is published online at the following address: http://www.broward.edu/studentlife/publications/Pages/Student-Handbook.aspx:
- 10.5 While appropriate for college-level study, course materials and class discussions may reflect topics not typically included in secondary courses which some parents may find objectionable for minors. Courses will not be modified to accommodate variations in student age and/or maturity;
- 10.6 To minimize student costs for excess hours, parents/students should select courses to meet high school graduation and college degree requirements;
- 10.7 It is the students' responsibility to attend all college classes in which they are enrolled;
- 10.8 High school students are responsible for completing the proper college process and notifying their high school if they choose to withdraw from a course. Faculty members are required to report non-attendance throughout the term up to the 60% period. When students do not attend class up to the 60% period, the student can be withdrawn from the course by faculty based on the class attendance policy, or the student's non-attendance. The high school is responsible for advising the student each semester at which time the student's eligibility for enrollment in specific approved courses at Broward College must be verified by the high school principal.
- 10.9 Broward County School Board will not be held responsible for the tuition payment for a course in which a student has withdrawn. A reconciliation process will be in place at the end of each major term to identify the withdrawn students and credit the SBBC accordingly.

ARTICLE 11 - GRADE POINT AVERAGE EXCEPTIONS

11.1 There are no grade point average exceptions for dual enrollment.

ARTICLE 12 - COLLEGE REGISTRATION POLICY

12.1 Dual enrollment students are permitted to register for courses at the same time as Broward College students. Registration dates for each term are outlined in the <u>college's</u> registration calendars.

ARTICLE 13 - EXCEPTIONS TO FACULTY HANDBOOK

13.1 There are no exceptions to the professional rules, guidelines, and expectations stated in the faculty handbook for Broward College. All faculty members must meet or exceed the academic and professional preparation requirements for teaching at BC. Appropriate SBBC and BC staff shall meet and confer to recommend qualified faculty for dual enrollment classes. As an example, faculty teaching general education courses must have completed at least eighteen (18) graduate semester hours in the teaching discipline and have at least a master's degree; BC shall approve all instructors. BC will evaluate instruction and monitor student performance in all dual enrollment classes using the same criteria for judging instructional quality as is in effect in all classes offered at the college. SBBC and BC will address additional oversight and compliance measures for dual enrollment courses taught at high schools to meet the state and accreditation requirements related to program rigor and quality regarding curriculum, environmental, and accountability/assessment standards. All dual enrollment courses taught on the high school campus will be limited to registered dual enrolled students whose applications have been accepted by BC. High school students who have not been admitted by BC may not be included in the dual enrollment course.

ARTICLE 14 – STUDENT HANDBOOK EXCEPTIONS FOR FACULTY

14.1 There are no exceptions to the student handbook rules or guidelines, and expectations.

ARTICLE 15 – SCHOOL DISTRICT RESPONSIBILITIES REGARDING STUDENT ELIGIBILITY AND PERFORMANCE MONITORING

- 15.1 BC will provide training at District Guidance Counselor meetings at least once per academic year.
- 15.2 Principals and guidance counselors are responsible for determining student eligibility and monitoring student performance and enrollment status to avoid pitfalls that may prevent students from completing high school graduation requirements.
- 15.3 SBBC shall annually assess the demand for dual enrollment and provide that information to BC by December 1st pursuant to Florida Statutes Section 1007.271.
- 15.4 An SBBC District Home School official will only sign recommendation forms for home education students who have not earned an associate's degree. After earning an

associate's degree or the student turns 19 (whichever occurs first), the home education student may not be admitted to BC as a dual enrollment student unless otherwise provided by law.

ARTICLE 16 - TRANSMISSION OF STUDENT GRADES

16.1 Students participating in Dual Enrollment at BC will receive grades and appropriate credit for their college work. These grades and credits are posted on the BC transcript as well as the high school transcript. Dual Enrollment grades become part of the student's permanent high school record maintained by SBBC and the student's permanent academic record maintained by BC.

ARTICLE 17 - COSTS

Per Florida Statute 1007.271, this article outlines a funding provision that delineates costs incurred by each entity.

- 17.1 SBBC shall pay the standard tuition rate per credit hour from funds provided in the Florida Education Finance Program to BC for providing instruction when such instruction takes place on BC's campuses/centers including online courses to cover instructional and support costs incurred by BC. BC will offer dual enrollment during the summer term; however, SBBC is not responsible for summer tuition costs.
- 17.2 When dual enrollment is provided on the high school site by BC faculty, the school district shall reimburse the costs associated with the proportion of salary and benefits and other actual costs incurred by BC to provide the instruction.
- 17.3 When dual enrollment is provided on the high school site by SBBC faculty, the SBBC shall be responsible only for BC's actual costs associated with offering the program.
- 17.4 BC will pay for the cost of the instructor for all dual enrollment courses taught by college faculty at a BC campus.
- 17.5 SBBC will pay for the cost of instructors for courses taught by SBBC faculty on a high school campus.
- 17.6 BC may enter into an agreement with SBBC to authorize teachers who teach dual enrollment courses at the high school site.
- 17.7 SBBC may not deny a student access to dual enrollment unless the student is ineligible to participate in the program subject to Florida Statute Section 1007.271.

ARTICLE 18 - TRANSPORTATION

18.1 All students must provide their own transportation. College Academy students may utilize SBBC and/or public transportation subject to the conditions published by the College Academy.

ARTICLE 19 - GENERAL CONDITIONS

- 19.1 <u>No Waiver of Sovereign Immunity.</u> Nothing herein is intended to serve as a waiver of sovereign immunity by any agency or political subdivision to which sovereign immunity may be applicable or of any rights or limits to liability existing under Section 768.28, Florida Statutes.
- 19.2 <u>No Third Party Beneficiaries.</u> The parties expressly acknowledge that it is not their intent to create or confer any rights or obligations in or upon any third party person or entity under this Agreement. None of the parties intend to directly or substantially benefit a third party by this Agreement. The parties agree that there are no third party beneficiaries to this Agreement and that no third party shall be entitled to assert a claim against any of the parties based upon this Agreement. Nothing herein shall be construed as consent by an agency or political subdivision of the State of Florida to be sued by third parties in any matter arising out of any contract.
- 19.3 <u>Non-Discrimination</u>. The parties shall not discriminate against any employee or participant in the performance of the duties, responsibilities and obligations under this Agreement because of race, age, religion, color, gender, national origin, marital status, disability, sexual orientation or any other basis prohibited by law.
- 19.4 <u>Termination</u>. This Agreement may be cancelled with or without cause by any party during the term hereof upon ninety (90) days written notice to the other party of its desire to terminate this Agreement.
- 19.5 <u>Records.</u> Each party shall maintain its own respective records and documents associated with this Agreement in accordance with the records retention requirements applicable to public records. Each party shall be responsible for compliance with any public documents request served upon it pursuant to Florida Statutes Section 119.07 and any resultant award of attorney's fees for non-compliance with that law.
- 19.6 Entire Agreement. This document incorporates and includes all prior negotiations, correspondence, conversations, agreements and understandings applicable to the matters contained herein and the parties agree that there are no commitments, agreements or understandings concerning the subject matter of this Agreement that are not contained in this document. Accordingly, the parties agree that no deviation from the terms hereof shall be predicated upon any prior representations or agreements, whether oral or written.
- 19.7 <u>Amendments.</u> No modification, amendment, or alteration in the terms or conditions contained herein shall be effective unless contained in a written document

prepared with the same or similar formality as this Agreement and executed by each party hereto.

- 19.8 <u>Preparation of Agreement.</u> The parties acknowledge that they have sought and obtained whatever competent advice and counsel as was necessary for them to form a full and complete understanding of all rights and obligations herein and that the preparation of this Agreement has been their joint effort. The language agreed to herein expresses their mutual intent and the resulting document shall not, solely as a matter of judicial construction, be construed more severely against one of the parties than the other.
- 19.9 <u>Waiver</u>. The parties agree that each requirement, duty and obligation set forth herein is substantial and important to the formation of this Agreement and, therefore, is a material term hereof. Any party's failure to enforce any provision of this Agreement shall not be deemed a waiver of such provision or modification of this Agreement. A waiver of any breach of a provision of this Agreement shall not be deemed a waiver of any subsequent breach and shall not be construed to be a modification of the terms of this Agreement.
- 19.10 <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. Each party shall comply with all applicable laws, codes, rules and regulations in performing its duties, responsibilities and obligations pursuant to this Agreement.
- 19.11 <u>Governing Law.</u> This Agreement shall be interpreted and construed in accordance with and governed by the laws of the State of Florida. Any controversies or legal problems arising out of this Agreement and any action involving the enforcement or interpretation of any rights hereunder shall be submitted to the jurisdiction of the State courts of the Seventeenth Judicial Circuit of Broward County, Florida.
- 19.12 <u>Binding Effect.</u> This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns.
- 19.13 <u>Assignment.</u> Neither this Agreement nor any interest herein may be assigned, transferred or encumbered by any party without the prior written consent of the other party. There shall be no partial assignments of this Agreement including, without limitation, the partial assignment of any right to receive payments from SBBC, BC or FAU.
- 19.14 <u>Force Majeure.</u> Neither party shall be obligated to perform any duty, requirement or obligation under this Agreement if such performance is prevented by fire, hurricane, earthquake, explosion, wars, sabotage, accident, flood, acts of God, strikes, or other labor disputes, riot or civil commotions, or by reason of any other matter or condition beyond the control of either party, and which cannot be overcome by reasonable diligence and without unusual expense (Force Majeure). In no event shall a lack of funds on the part of either party be deemed Force Majeure.

- 19.15 <u>Place of Performance.</u> All obligations of SBBC, BC and FAU under the terms of this Agreement are reasonably susceptible of being performed in Broward County, Florida and shall be payable and performable in Broward County, Florida.
- 19.16 <u>Severability.</u> In case any one or more of the provisions contained in this Agreement shall for any reason be held to be invalid, illegal, unlawful, unenforceable or void in any respect, the invalidity, illegality, unenforceability or unlawful or void nature of that provision shall not affect any other provision and this Agreement shall be considered as if such invalid, illegal, unlawful, unenforceable or void provision had never been included herein.
- 19.17 <u>Notice</u>. When any of the parties desire to give notice to the other, such notice must be in writing, sent by U.S. Mail, postage prepaid, addressed to the party for whom it is intended at the place last specified; the place for giving notice shall remain such until it is changed by written notice in compliance with the provisions of this paragraph. FIRST AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT

THIS FIRST AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT is made and entered into as of this 5th day of November, 2013, by and between

THE SCHOOL BOARD OF BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA

(hereinafter referred to as "SBBC"), a body corporate and political subdivision of the State of Florida, whose principal place of business is 600 Southeast Third Avenue, Fort Lauderdale, Florida 33301

and

BROWARD COLLEGE

(hereinafter referred to as "BC"), a political subdivision of the State of Florida whose principal place of business at 225 East Las Olas Boulevard, Fort Lauderdale, Florida 33301.

WHEREAS, SBBC and BC entered into an Agreement dated November 5, 2013 (hereafter "Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, the parties mutually desire to amend certain provisions of the Agreement.

The Parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1.01 <u>Recitals</u>. The Parties agree that the foregoing recitals are true and correct and that such recitals are incorporated herein by reference.
- 1.02 <u>Amended Provisions</u>. The parties hereby agree to the following amended provisions to the Agreement:
- 2.4 <u>Dual Enrollment Plan</u>. SBBC and BC agree to promote dual enrollment participation, manage the growth and maintain the level of rigor and quality associated with the Dual Enrollment Program via *Standard Tuition Payment Initiatives*. This Agreement is dependent on guidelines from the Florida Department of Education and is contingent upon SBBC's payment of tuition to BC to provide these services as well as the time for recruitment, selection, and training of Dual Enrollment personnel. The initiatives may include, but are not limited to, the following contributions by BC:
 - 1. Adopting school(s) with low dual enrollment participation rates;
 - Providing student success coaches at high schools to help students prepare for college, transition, tour the college campus, and enroll in approved dual enrollment courses including SLS1001 Strategies for Success;
 - 3. Providing scholarships for students who intend to complete a degree program at BC;

- 4. Offering professional development to include faculty-to-faculty articulation meetings to address college readiness as well as certify Master's-trained faculty to teach SLS1001;
- 5. Establish a college-wide BC Dual Enrollment Coordinator position
- 6. Establish Dual Enrollment Admissions Officer positions; and
- 7. Partnering to offer the PERT.
- 2.5 <u>Standard Tuition Rate</u>. SBBC shall pay the standard tuition rate per credit hour from funds provided in the Florida Education Finance Program to BC for providing instruction when such instruction takes place on BC's campuses/centers to cover instructional and support costs. BC will use the state's recommended tuition rate of \$71.98 per credit hour for classes not taken at a high school site.
- 2.6 Administrative Costs. In the spirit of collaboration, BC will not charge administrative costs related to registration and enrollment of students for classes offered on high school sites during the 2013-14 academic year. To ensure consistent quality of course delivery at high school sites, qualified discipline experts from BC will observe dual enrollment classes and provide feedback to the parties indicated by the SBBC. A fee of \$150.00 per class observation will be assessed for each different course offered at the high school site. Observations will not exceed one per course per semester for each teacher at the high school site. BC will analyze all administrative costs and share the data with SBBC to establish the fair cost for future years.
- 2.7 <u>Dual Enrollment Course List</u>. Dual Enrollment students enrolled in the College Academy program will not be limited to the courses listed on the Dual Enrollment Course List, Appendix A. Students will be permitted to take the additional courses required to earn their planned Associates Degree.
- 1.03 Order of Precedence Among Agreement Documents. In the event of conflict between the provisions of the Agreement and the provisions contained herein, the provisions of the following documents shall take precedence in this order:
 - a) this First Amendment to Agreement; and
 - b) the Agreement.
- 1.04 <u>Other Provisions Remain in Force.</u> Except as expressly provided herein, all other portions of the Agreement remain in full force and effect.
- 1.05 <u>Authority</u>. Each person signing this First Amendment to Agreement on behalf of either party individually warrants that he or she has full legal power to execute this First Amendment to Agreement on behalf of the party for whom he or she is signing, and to bind and obligate such party with respect to all provisions contained in this First Amendment to Agreement.
